"Throughout medical school, many of us had training in delivering bad news to a family in the hospital. However, as he discussed from his experience, he has developed close relationships with many patients [but] he has not been there for their death. Not being there at the time of their death was not a reason not to pass on condolences to a family and showing gratitude for having been given a chance to get to know the patient. He reads us one of the many letters he has written and asks us to write a letter to a family of a patient. I am grateful for having had this experience because I believe this was a unique experience that will make me a better doctor and person."
